## AI-enabled tool may translate your thoughts into speech

US engineers have developed an Artificial Intelligence (AI)-enabled system that can translate brain signals into intelligible speech, a breakthrough that may help those who cannot speak to communicate with the outside world.

The study, led by Columbia University researchers, showed that by monitoring one's brain activity, an AI-enabled technology can reconstruct words a person hears with unprecedented clarity, according to news sources.

A team of neuroscientists from the university trained a voice synthesiser or vocoder to measure the brain activity patterns of epilepsy patients already undergoing surgery while the patients listened to sentences spoken by different people.

Those patients listened to speakers reading digits between zero to nine while recording brain signals via the vocoder. Then, they used a neural network, a type of artificial intelligence, to analyze the signals, and gave robotic sounding voices.

"We found that people could understand and repeat the sounds about 75 per cent of the time, which is well above and beyond any previous attempts," says Nima Mesgarani, from the university. Previous research showed that when people imagine speaking, patterns of activity take place in the brain and those patterns of signals also emerge when we listen to someone speak or imagine listening.

## Finding ways to help kids learn during playtime

**MUMBAI** Concerned with the rise in usage of smartphones among children and the subsequent reduction in time dedicated for physical activity, a group of educators has come up with a policy for playtime.

The Early Childhood Association (ECA), a national body of early education handover in Pune, published a 14-page document outlining the importance of play at different age groups and the various types of play that can help with child development at each stage.

The document lists 26 different categories of play activities and has been approved by the new development chapter of the Indian Academy of Pediatrics (IAP). Some of the categories include social play, where a child learns about rules and criteria for the social

#### PLAY LIST FOR BETTER DEVELOPMENT

Here are some of the play categories out of 26 listed by the Early Childhood Association

- Symbolic play**  
 Allows control, gradual exploration and increased understanding without the risk of being out of depth.  
**Example:** Using a piece of wood to symbolise an object.
- Imaginative play**  
 Close encounter play which is less to do with fighting and more to do with touching, tickling and playing relative strength.
- Socio-dramatic play**  
 Enacting real and potential experiences which are personal, social, interpersonal.  
**Example:** House activities, going to the shop, role-playing parents.



**Social play**  
 Rules and criteria for social engagement and interaction can be revised, explored and amended.  
**Example:** Conversation on topics, making something together.

**Locomotor play**  
 Movement in any or every direction for its own sake.  
**Example:** Chase, tag, hide-and-seek, tree climbing.

"ECA, therefore, has come up with the country's first play policy which can be used by parents, educators and the government."

The policy has also identified the various types of toys which would help develop various skills among children, such as building toys, building toys, role-play toys and creative toys.

As per the policy, toddlers and preschoolers should be physically active for at least three hours every day.

Dr Sumit Dubai, a city-based developmental paediatrician and former president of the IAP, said that playtime needs to be considered as an important factor for the overall development of a child.

"In the coming days, the play policy would be circulated among paediatricians across the country and they would be encouraged to 'prescribe' play for children," Dubai said.

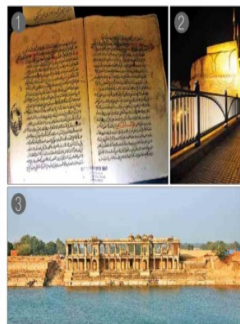

Interestingly, this library gets visitors who deal with history, from across the world. It is a favourite among history scholars and researchers because of its valuable books.



The Pir Muhammad Shah Library is the oldest library of Ahmedabad, located at Pankornaka. The library is on the premises of the tomb of the founder of the city, Ahmed Shah, a Sufi saint who was born in Rajasthan in 1411 and migrated to Ahmedabad in 1411.

According to historian Dr. Arun Kulkarni, the library has many manuscripts, some of which were written by the founder of the city, Ahmed Shah. "Most of the documents stored in the library are in Urdu and Arabic languages, which have not been explored so far. There are many unutilized manuscripts which need to be digitized and made available to the public," he said.

Kulkarni said that the library has a collection of more than 4,000 manuscripts, which were written in Arabic by scholars in the 15th Century. The book is hand-written and the text is preserved in the library, so the only way to read it is to visit the library.

### A rare mosque where women can pray

Generally, women are not allowed to pray in mosques, but in Ahmedabad, the Anwar Masjid has a place where women can pray. Talking about its history, historian Arun Kulkarni said that when the city was established, Anwar Masjid had provision for women to pray.



The oldest mosque of Ahmedabad — Anwar Masjid — is also known as Shahi Jami Masjid or Jami Anwar Masjid. It had women praying within its premises for ages. This was the first mosque to have been built by Ahmed Shah. According to the Archaeological Department, it was erected in 1411.

Anwar often refers to Anwar Masjid. The mosque is a symbol of the city's history and its culture. It has a unique architecture and is a must-visit for tourists.

"History of women into mosque is very rare. When the city was established, there was a provision for women to enter the mosque and pray," he said.

According to professor Shrikant Kulkarni, who has documented many photographs of people praying in the mosque, said that this is the culture of Ahmedabad. "This is a very much a part of Ahmedabad's culture. Many cultural and religious have been documented here. When you click photographs, I see many women praying in the mosque, which is a rarity. Women are allowed to pray in the Anwar Masjid and Dhad," said the professor.

# To boost entrepreneurship, Delhi to give college students ₹5k/yr

Those In Classes 11 & 12 To Get ₹1,000 Each A Yr

New Delhi: The Delhi government will give Rs 1,000 to every student in classes XI and XII in its schools annually and Rs 5,000 to each government college student as seed money under its entrepreneurship curriculum. The biggest problem in the country is unemployment and it can be resolved by teaching entrepreneurship to students and making them job creators, not job seekers, education minister Manish Sisodia said while announcing the decision on Wednesday.

Accompanied by entrepreneurs like the founder of MDH,



Deputy CM Manish Sisodia said unemployment is the biggest problem and it can be solved by teaching entrepreneurship.

Mahesh Dharmapal Gulati, and Flipkart co-founder Binny Bansal, the deputy chief minister also said this course would encourage students to start business ventures and teach them how to take risk. "Even if 1% of our students go on to become entrepreneurs, India will become a superpower," said Sisodia while addressing hundreds of teachers and principals at Thapar Sports Complex.

The education minister pointed out how foreign delegates often praised the government's happiness curriculum and spoke about emulating it. The entrepreneurship curriculum will have the same impact, he claimed. "We are giving degrees to students but whenever there is even a clerk's job, thousands of PhD holders apply for it. This is because we don't tell them what to do with the knowledge."

India's economy, Sisodia said, has not progressed because there are many job-seekers, but not job-creators. "Often, I ask schoolchildren how many want to get jobs. Almost all of them say they want to. If all of them search for jobs, who will create jobs? That answer will

be solved by our curriculum."

Praising entrepreneurs like Bansal, Gulati and Krishna Yadav of Shri Krishna Pickles, the minister said, "When economy is in peril, true patriotism is to create jobs in the country. We need to connect providing jobs with patriotism." The curriculum will help children let go of their fear and do something creative "so that they can eventually create jobs for thousands of people", Sisodia said at the event, which was streamed live to 1,00 government schools. The government will allocate up to Rs 9 crore in the budget in the next financial year so that students can get the seed money to start generating ideas of a business plan. Flipkart co-founder Bansal said, "Job creation can be through entrepreneurs. And to create entrepreneurs, we need a change of mindset."

UNESCO report on mother tongue literacy, which states that around 40% of the global population has no access to education in a language they speak or understand, and the 2016 Global Education Monitoring report, which mentions that imposing a dominant language through a school system in multi-ethnic societies is a 'source of grievance linked to wider issues of social and cultural inequality'.

"In India and other parts of the world, there is a yawning gap between the language spoken at home and the medium of instruction at school. This can lead to children feeling alienated and reading at lower grade levels. This disengagement with the learning process can even cause children to drop out of school altogether," she said, adding that the digital storybooks provide a link between the language spoken at home and the medium of instruction in school.

Sharad Prakash Suryawanshi, program manager, Unnati ISEC, which has been working in Maharashtra's Vidarbha region with children from the Korku tribal community, said the material readied in Korku has helped children ease into the formal education system after the first one or two levels.

"Very few students would manage to progress to the higher classes as the Marathi-medium was very difficult for them to catch up with. There were no books in Korku until we started at the end of 2017. We readied material in Korku for different levels: songs, stories and reading for the first level and writing for the second level. We integrate aspects such as village experiences, animals and gender equality into the material. Till now, we have translated around 140 books, and are trying to get community volunteers to write original stories," she said.

## Digital 'hyperlocal libraries' offer books in underserved languages - Stories in your mother tongue

Imagine a library with books for children in languages ranging from Kannada, Tamil and Marathi to Marwari, Siberian and Bundeikhandi.

In an attempt to bring in diversity into the reading habits of children, encourage reading in their mother tongue, and aid learning in formal classrooms, digital 'hyperlocal libraries' are offering content that is free, downloadable, and reusable.

One such open source digital platform is Story Weaver from Pratham Books that offers over 18 lakh reads in 148 languages. Under its 'Freedom to Read 2019' campaign, 11 organizations and eight individuals were chosen to help build hyper local digital libraries in 30 languages, including 14 'underserved languages' such as Korku, Marwari, Pawari and Santaki. Launch of the gateway to this material coincides with International Mother Language Day on Thursday.

Speaking to The Hindu, Suzanne Singh, Chairperson, Parham Books cited a new

Purvi Shah, Head - Digital Initiatives, Parham Books said Story Weaver serves as a resource for teachers, educators, and literacy organizations. "Educators are able to integrate books from Story Weaver into lesson plans and expose children to reading material with an Indian context featuring characters and settings they can actually relate to, narrated in their mother tongue. To give you an example, Suchana, an education support group for children from Santhali and Kora villages around Shantiniketan, has created a mix of translations and original stories in Santali and Kora, written in the Bengali script. As of now, 200-odd titles have been translated into the two tribal languages and some have even been printed into books," she said.

### **Centre launches ₹9,000 crore plan to digitize education delivery**

The move will make the teaching process interactive and popularize 'flipped learning'

Human resource development (HRD) minister Prakash Javadekar said the initiative by the "digital board" will be implemented over the three years beginning 2019-20 academic year.

### **A Turning Point for Scholarly Publishing - Open Access**

Though initiatives to make published research more freely available have for years poked at the publishing industry's armor, these efforts — known as the open-access movement — have not toppled the norms of how academic work is distributed and read.

#### **TAKEAWAYS:**

Bottom-up efforts and top-down decrees make this a major turning point for open-access publishing.

Some large library systems are pursuing new types of subscription packages with publishers. Negotiators want one package that would cover subscription charges and open-access publishing fees.

National research foundations in about a dozen European countries have joined a coalition that would force the academics they fund to publish their research under an open-access model. Comments on implementation were due in February.

One challenge: Departments largely do not consider open-access publication in their promotion-and-tenure decisions.

**‘Despite digital progress, books will remain forever’**

Despite the digital revolution in the country, library of printed books would remain forever in the country,” State Planning Board Member RN Das here said on Friday.

Attending as chief guest on the inaugural ceremony of a national seminar on “Public Library and Digital Divide, Opportunities and Challenges,” Das said printed books

are the fundamental knowledge; it will never die. Library would remain for all sections of the society which provides basic information from the primary level to the highest level of knowledge, Das said while narrating his own experience of using library from the primary school level to the present level.

Stating that although there the love for books is increasing in Odisha but the standard of library has gone down and also there is no standard book store in the State for which according to him “a strong library moment is essential.” Public library is people’s university, he said, adding efforts should be made for its improvement.

Inaugurating the two-day seminar, Sambalpur MLA Dr Raseswari Panigrahi appreciated the efforts of the members of the Sambalpur Public library for organising such a high standard seminar. She said the digital platforms cannot provide total knowledge as books provide for which the role of a library is very much essential in the society.

Attending as guest of honour, former Director, Raja Rammohan Roy Library Foundation , Ministry of Culture , Government of India, Dr Arun Kumar Chakraborty said books cannot be digital. Only a portion can be pasted in the computer to provide a brief knowledge.

With the invention of digital, the reading habits among the students is fast disappearing and they want shortcut for everything.

Addressing on the occasion, Dr Prabhakar Rath of Mizoram University said the role of library has been changing from its traditional method of access to the digital data. The mobiles which were used as voice communication are now working as



data library and can be operated from any corners of the country.

Presenting the key note address, Prof Uma Kanjilal of IGNOU, New Delhi, stressed the need of adoption of new technology while keeping the book knowledge intact.
