Major academic publishers are being urged to reduce their prices by 25 per cent on all agreements in light of the severe financial impact institutions are facing because of the Covid-19 pandemic.

In a joint letter on behalf of the sector, the Universities UK Jisc content negotiation strategy group says it 'recognises the tremendous support publishers have offered to institutions and colleges as they responded by opening up their content and collections during the start of the crisis'. It continues: 'The focus of institutions is now on preparing for online delivery in September and examining what digital content they can afford to maintain access against to the budgetary efficiencies they will need to deliver.'
