Andhra Pradesh to set up digital libraries to support work from home employees, students' online education

The Andhra Pradesh government is planning to set up digital libraries at the village level, with a high-speed internet facility to help with the online classes of students and support the IT and employees of other sectors working from home.

The move by Chief Minister Jaganmohan Reddy comes at a time when fears over a third wave of the Covid-19 pandemic loom large and the uncertainty continues as to when the IT and other sectors' offices would resume pre-pandemic operations.

Numerous techies from Andhra Pradesh, who form a considerable portion of the IT industry manpower in hubs like Bengaluru, Hyderabad and Chennai moved back to their home towns and villages when the pandemic began in the summer of 2020. Many of them continue to operate from their native places.

During a review meeting on the IT sector on Tuesday, Reddy asked officials to take measures for high-speed internet connectivity in the villages to support the Work From Home concept...

Resistance

Last year, in the middle of the pandemic, the uncertainty, and the government incompetence maliciousness, there was one bright point for people in the UK. Prime Minister Boris Johnson visited Castle Rock School to give a televised speech. This wasn't the bright point that honour went to the display of books placed by the school's librarian, which loomed over Johnson's shoulders and. viewers and commenters believe. expressed exactly what the librarian thought about the school's illustrious visitor. The books included stories about authoritarian dystopias, such Fahrenheit 451 and The Subtle Knife by Philip Pullman; pointed titles Betrayed and The Resistance; and a little extra snark through the inclusion of Roald Dahl's The Twits. While the school remained vague about whether books had been specifically chosen, the public saw the display as a sly dig at the Conservative government's handling of COVID-19, as well as their social policies regarding education and welfare...

Boys are way behind girls when it comes to reading. Why is this happening and how can it be fixed?



Florida boys do not read as well as girls. That's what all sorts of data show.

In 2019, for example, 4th and 8th grade girls alike scored 9 points higher than boys in Florida, according to a federal reading exam called the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), also known as the Nation's report card.

On the international scene, a study conducted in 2018 showed that boys had lower reading achievement than girls in 40 countries, according to the Program for International Student Assessment, or PISA. That study related to 15 year olds.

So why are boys not scoring as high as girls on reading assessments? Several factors likely are involved, experts say, everything from stereotypes to socio-economics.

The Florida Legislature in 2021 unanimously approved a bill to create a task force aimed at closing the gap between boys and girls in reading performance...
