a wide variety of subjects, donated mainly by senior citizens across Mumbai.


Anyone can pick up a book of their choice and take it away for free after writing down their name and contact number on a register, and return it later.

Looking for the oldest public library in India? Head to Thiruvananthapuram



In the heart of Thiruvananthapuram city stands India's oldest library—the State Central Library. A traditional redand-white Victorian-style building, it was built in 1829 during the reign of Swati Tirunal, the legendary musician king.

Then British Resident Colonel Edward Cadogan was entrusted with the task

of starting the library; Cadogan was the grandson of Sir Hans Sloane, whose vast collection became the founding collection of the British Museum. Only English books were initially available. The library was open only to British officers and local elite, despite being called Trivandrum People's Library...

This 19-Yr-Old Is On Mission To Improve Education System In Bihar With Her 'Community Library Project'



Bihar is India's third-most populous state, with 99 million people. However, the literacy rate here is the country's lowest at 61.8 per cent; and the female literacy rate is second lowest at 61.8 per cent, according to Census 2011.

Considering all these factors, 19-yearold Sadiya Riyaz Shaikh has started a project called 'The Community Library Project' to help children in remote villages of Bihar.

The project aims to encourage them not to discontinue their studies and work in fields, that are the major causes of the increase in Child Labour and child marriages, especially girls. Sadiya graduated from Mumbai University. She was born in Bihar but later moved with her family to Mumbai for better education and prospects...


landscape lies the majestic, classicalstyle Arvindbhai Maniyar Hall, which is nearly 150 years old. Formerly known as Connaught Hall, it used to serve as the Assembly Hall for the erstwhile independent state of Saurashtra.



While the northern part of the Victorian sandstone building houses the Gujarat government's Watson Museum, the central hall is owned by the Rajkot Municipal Corporation (RMC) which uses the space to host community events. Since 1893, the southern wing of the heritage building has been home to one of the oldest public libraries in India, Arvindbhai Maniyar Pustakalaya, popularly known as Lang Library, where Kalpa is employed as its primary caretaker...

VADODARA: If you are finding it difficult to locate a book at the Central Library, one of the oldest and biggest libraries in the state, don't fret too much.

I think my passion for work apart from the experience gained over the years may have honed my memory," said Rao, who is tasked with cleaning the books and arranging them neatly in the racks every day....
