Guidelines for Poster Presentation

All current LIS students (BLIS, MLIS, Ph.D.) from different Departments and Schools within Gujarat are eligible to submit a poster.

Only one poster per student will be accepted.

Measurements:

Posters should be prepared in A1 size (33.1x23.4 inches). It can be in portrait or landscape orientation.

Content and design:

All posters on any of the themes and sub-themes should include the title, name of authors, and institution.

Content must be original. The poster will be disqualified if found plagiarized. Poster can be prepared in any of the following languages: English, Hindi, and Gujarati.

The lettering of the title should be at least 25 mm high and the main text at least 10 mm high.

The poster should be easily readable from a distance of 2 meters.

The **soft copy** of the poster must be submitted by email for selection: alibnet@gmail.com.

Posters fulfilling the above criteria will be **evaluated and selected** for display and presentation. Printed copy will be required if selected for display at the Conference Venue.

Seminar Organizers will provide the space and equipment for setting up the posters on the boards. The poster will be available for viewing participants during all hours of the event.

Presentation:

Each poster presenter will be given an opportunity to present their poster content during a specific allotted time. Each presenter will be allowed approximately 5 minutes for the presentation. The time allowed for the presentation is subject to change depending the number on submissions. Presenters will be notified of changes in advance.

All participants are encouraged to visit the posters during the breaks and contact the main author during the seminar.

Norwegian The library with unreadable books



Some of the world's most celebrated authors have written manuscripts that won't be published for a century why? Richard Fisher visits the Future Library in Oslo to find out.

One recent Sunday morning, in a forest north of Oslo in Norway, more than 200 people gathered to watch a ceremony. They had walked in a procession -- some with their dogs, others their children - along gravel trails, directed by arrows on the ground made from sprinkled wood shavings. The air carried a scent of pine needles, burnt logs and strong Norwegian coffee.

At their destination – a recently planted forest - the people sat or crouched on a slope dotted with spruce trees. Each tree was still only around 1m (3ft) tall, but one day, when the spruces are more than 20-30 times the size, they will provide the paper for a special collection of books. Everyone there knew they would not live to see that happen, nor would they ever get to read the books...

A Visual Journey through Albion's Psvchic Landscape explores England's population, rituals myths through art and photography, with accompanying text by writer and Suede bassist Mat Osman. Relatedly, PJ Harvey has made something beautiful in Orlam, a dialect-heavy ode to the land...

NEP: why creating digital library remain a challenge for the government



Even as the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, focuses on enabling the education sector besides harnessing the power of digital, yet achieving those remain a uphill task. In 2015. the education launched ministry of National Digital Library of India (NDLI) with the aim to provide digital learning resources across the country. "Implementing any project at grassroot level is a bit difficult. In terms of outreach we have worked with various schools, in which 90% are private schools, and only 10% are government schools. The reason is that most of the schools are run by the state, which contradictory brings forth political grounds while operating," Vignesh Sornamohan, Chief Strategic and Outreach Officer, NDLI, told FE Education...

Anythink announces Nature Library in partnership with City of Thornton



Anythink Libraries and the City of Thornton have entered an agreement to build a nature library on the current Aylor Open Lands property at 136th

Avenue and Quebec Street Thornton. After years of planning, Thornton City Council and Anythink Board of Trustees have signed intergovernmental an agreement that would lease 15 acres to the district, with plans to build a 35,000-square- foot nature library. The other 140 acres of open lands will be programmed by the Anythink team and reserved for nature learning and exploration.

The Anythink Nature Library will be designed to support the wellbeing of Thornton community through spaces, experiences and collections. The library will act as a natural extension of the Aylor Open Lands and will encourage people of all ages to spend time outdoors learning about stars, water, wildlife and seasonal changes to help build a culture of environmental stewardship. natural experience is intended to spark imagination and creativity, while providing a place to practice being human...
