Researchers push preprint reviews to improve scientific communications

For decades, peer reviewing technical manuscripts before they were published in a journal was a regular duty for senior scientists. But James Fraser, a structural biologist at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF), says he hasn't reviewed a paper for a journal in years. Instead, Fraser and members of his lab focus on reviewing preprint studies that are posted online whenever authors like, bypassing a journal's peer-review process.



Critiquing preprints offers bia advantages over traditional, journalbased peer review, Fraser argues. Authors can get expert feedback more quickly-sometimes in days instead of months-and from a bigger and more diverse pool of reviewers. The process also can be more efficient: Reviewers can focus solely on the quality of the science without worrying about whether a paper is a good fit for a particular journal. And the reviews can be shared with everyone, not just authors and editors. "This is valuable stuff that's often locked up" in the traditional review process, which at most journals is confidential, he notes...
